About the School

Montclair Kimberley Academy is one of the largest independent day schools in New Jersey, located on three campuses with traditions dating back to 1887. There are 176 faculty members; 88% hold advanced degrees. MKA currently enrolls students in grades Pre-K through 12 from more than 85 communities in New Jersey and New York. There are 446 students in the Upper School; the Class of 2026 numbers 113 students.

Global Experience

MKA values the integration of classroom learning and real-world experience. The Global Experience program empowers students to think critically about and cultivate empathy for the classroom beyond our walls and to gain the skills necessary to be more informed, ethical and active global citizens. Students can participate in our PenPal programs with schools in China, Tanzania, and Morroco, various virtual experiences such as cooking classes and manga lessons, and our travel programs over Spring Break, May Term and summer. Through these opportunities, students find themselves in a position to affect meaningful change because they are encouraged to build bridges between themselves and people in other places.

May Term

May Term provides a transitional learning experience for seniors, helping to prepare them for life beyond high school. Options include group travel, independent projects, internships, service projects, and an entrepreneurial venture known as Startup 101. In recent years, students have utilized AI to create a translator for underrepresented languages, written, directed and performed an original theater production, interned with a National Geographic photographer, assisted in collegiate biochemistry research, and launched a tick repellent business.

Academic Program & Diploma Requirements

Grading Policies

MKA does not weight grades or rank its students. Only graded courses taken at MKA are used in the GPA calculation. Graduates must earn 120 credits, including 4 years of English, 3 years of a single World Language, 3 years of Mathematics, 3 years of History, 3 years of Science; 9 credits in the Fine and Performing Arts, and 4.5 credits in Health, Wellness and Physical Education.

Curriculum Notes

Classes meet for 75 minutes, 4 times in an 8-day cycle, with an average class size of 14. Beyond the 5 traditional academic disciplines, curricular offerings include courses in computer science and the fine and performing arts. Course placements are based on student achievement and teacher recommendation, and do not always conform to grade-level generalizations below. Honors courses are accelerated courses for qualified students who have shown exceptional ability and who work well independently. Students are recommended for honors courses by meeting specific prerequisites and may request only one honors course against recommendation each school year. Enrollment in AP courses is by faculty invitation only and all students are required to take the corresponding exam in May. Students may not request any AP or Post-AP course against recommendation.

AP Courses and Exams

MKA offers AP courses and exams in the following subjects: English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition; Chinese Language and Culture, French Language and Culture, Latin, Spanish Language and Culture; Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Calculus AB/BC, Computer Science A, Statistics; Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Physics 1, Physics C: Mechanics and Electricity & Magnetism; Music Theory and Studio Art.

The Class of 2025 took 396 exams in 17 subjects. 90% of exams earned scores of 3 or higher; 65% earned scores of 4 or 5. This class includes 10 AP Scholars, 11 AP Scholars with Honors, and 39 AP Scholars with Distinction.

Disciplinary Policy

Montclair Kimberley Academy generally believes in maintaining confidentiality in matters of discipline. At times, however, major rule violations by students may have consequences beyond the confines of school. Many college applications pose questions about a candidate's high school disciplinary record to which students and college counselors will respond honestly, consistent with the *Guide to Ethical Practice in College Admission* of the National Association for College Admission Counseling. It is also MKA's policy to notify institutions when a student has been separated from the school for a period of more than five days. All colleges at which the student has active applications or at which the student is holding an offer of admission will be notified only of the date of suspension, withdrawal, or dismissal. It is the student's responsibility to inform the college of the circumstances surrounding this change of status. As advocates for students, counselors will continue to work closely with students and their families throughout any disciplinary proceeding.
